Dear Family and Friends of First Lutheran,

The seasons and events of our lives are filled with changes. Death and taxes may be certain, but the Word of the Lord who loves you is even more certain than those. How can we be sure? Look to the cross and empty tomb, *He's Risen. He's Risen Indeed! Hallelujah. Thanks God!* Now I have to mow the lawn.

The Existence of Pain & Suffering in the World

One of the most common objections to Christianity we hear is the existence of pain and suffering in the world. Why would a God who is both loving and all-powerful permit such a state of affairs? Why would He not simply intervene and immediately wipe away all harm and evil from the world? While this may be a fair objection to some religious beliefs, it is not a challenge to the orthodox Christian faith.

The world as we see it is not how God made it or meant it to be. God's creation, including mankind, was very good (*Gen. 1:31*). The pleasant land where man dwelt was a place of life and plenty (*Gen.2*). But through the disobedience of our first parents, sin entered the world and broke this goodness; the ground was cursed, and death was introduced as a result of sin (*Gen.3; Rom. 5:12-14,6:23*). It would certainly be possible for God to simply wipe away sin, by destroying all that is evil (*cf. Gen.6-7*) but the objectors offer this suggestion without realizing that this would mean their own demise, for they stand guilty before a perfect and holy God. Indeed, God's law requires an absolute perfection that they cannot hope to attain by their own nature and work, which amount to nothing (*Ps. 51:5; Mt. 5:48; Rom. 3:9-20, 23*). They ought, in fact, to be eternally thankful that God does not do as they wish since they discount or ignore God's righteousness and justice.

This could, perhaps, have simply been a problem for us. However, because God loves the world and does not wish for any to perish (*Ezek. 18-32; Jn.3:16; 1 Tim. 2:4; Pet. 3:9*), He made the problem of sin, pain, and death His own by bearing the brokenness and punishment Himself. Jesus Christ and Him crucified is God's answer to the problem of pain, so much so that Christianity makes no sense without the existence of sin and death. For it is through the cross that God has reconciled a sinful world to himself (*Rom.5:6-11; Cor.5:18; Col.1:22*). Hence Jesus is the solution, who bears our sin and gives us His righteousness, so that we become clean, righteous, and perfect in the eyes of the Father, to the end that we may have eternal life free from the evil that originally infected the world (*Rom. 5-6; 2 Cor. 5; Col. 1; Titus 3:4-7*).

In that case, then, why does wickedness and suffering persist? While the kingdom of God has been established and is present among us, it has not yet come into its fullness. Likewise, although we are recipients of new life in Christ, we still for the time struggle against our sinful flesh (Rom. 6,7). But we have the promise that sin and evil will pass away, and God's very good creation will be restored (Rev. 21-22; see also 1 Cor. 15). Any delay is out of God's mercy and patience, that many more might be saved—among not only us but also future generations (2 Pet. 3:1-10). One might respond that this explains much, but it does not explain why God did not prevent a particular tragedy in a person's life. However, once we have established that the Christian faith explains God's answer to evil and suffering writ large—and in such a personal and costly way, through the sacrifice of His only begotten Son—this objection is no longer that God must not be both loving and powerful, but rather it becomes a simply a complaint that God is not behaving as the speaker would if he were God. At this point it is appropriate to simply to defer to the infinitely greater wisdom and proven love of God, and trust in the rightness and goodness of his purposes (Rom. 8:18, 9:15-24; 2 Cor.4:7-18, 6:1-13; Heb.12:3-11).

From this we can see that the common objection of pain, suffering, and death is not an objection to the Christian faith. It is, rather, the very problem that Jesus Himself answers with his own body and blood.

DON & RUTH DETVILER

This month we are honored to bring to you the beautiful story of Don and Ruth Detviler. Don Detviler was born in Hancock, Minnesota, on November 28, 1937, and was baptized within a month in a small Wisconsin Synod Lutheran Church. Because he was born at home, his mother, Margaret (nee Forbes), took him to the local market to weigh him on the vegetable scales! When Don was six months old, the family moved to California so that his fa-

ther, Harold, could find employment. They settled in Bell Gardens and later moved to Santa Fe Springs. He attended Compton Jr. College and later went to work at Northrup Aircraft and then to North American, which later became Rockwell and then Boeing. He created procedure manuals and did electronic mock-up for the Minute Man, the Apollo, the Space Shuttle program, and the GPS Systems. He has a brother Ray (now deceased) and a sister, Cheryl, who lives in Riverside.

Ruth, nee Kalthoff, came into this world on June 16, 1938, in Raton, New Mexico. She was baptized two weeks later by her father. Her parents were Marie (nee Bockelman) and Reinhold Kalthoff. Her father was an LCMS pastor serving two missions in New Mexico. She has one brother, Robert, who lives in Northridge. During World War II, he became a chaplain in the Armed Forces. One of Ruth's most vivid memories was going with her father to see his troop depart for the European Conflict and hearing him say; "So many of these boys will not return." Sadly, he was correct; the majority of them did not. Her father was then sent to the war in the Pacific, namely Okinawa. After the war they moved to Leavenworth, Kansas where her father served as a chaplain in the federal, state and military prisons. They then moved to Denver, Colorado where he became a hospital chaplain. When Ruth was a junior in high school the family moved to Bell Gardens, California, and she attended Los Angeles Lutheran High School in Inglewood and Compton College.

In 1945, Don's parents became charter members of the Lutheran Church in Bell Gardens, and in 1954, Ruth's father accepted a call to that LCMS church, so it was inevitable that they would meet. They were married at the young age of 19. (Their parents were not happy but accepted their decision.) Ruth's father married them with the text "As for me and my house we will serve the Lord" (Joshua 25:15). They rented an apartment in Bell, and when they were 20 years old they bought their first home in Downey. While Don had no problem qualifying for a home loan at that young age, they laugh at the fact that they had to have Don's mother co-sign for them to purchase a washing machine!! They lived in that home four years and then purchased a home in Anaheim and remained there for 40 years, before moving to Corona. Don worked with the same company (41 years) before he retired. Ruth was a stay-at-home mom until their fourth child was three years old when she taught preschool for two years and then became the school secretary at Zion for 13 years, and later at Orange Lutheran High where she was the secretary to the Executive Director for twelve years. They were members at Zion Lutheran Church in Anaheim for 35 years and transferred to St. John's, Orange, only because their son became a pastor there.

The Detvilers' have four children. Their daughter Heidi lives in Anaheim and retired from many happy years at Disneyland; Tim is the chaplain at Orange Lutheran High School and lives in Orange; Michael, retired from the Marines, lives in Phoenix, Arizona; and John lives in Corona and is the operations manager at Medix Ambulance in Mission Viejo. All attended Zion Lutheran School and Orange Lutheran High. They have twelve grandchildren and fifteen greatgrandchildren. They have a boat and two wave runners which they enjoy when their family gathers at Lake Mohave every year. They also have a trailer on their son Michael's property (he has horse property), and they love going there and relaxing in their trailer and enjoying the Arizona gang. Both are avid sports fans (football and baseball) and have spent many a Saturday attending the games (mostly soccer) of their grandchildren and their "greats."

They became caregivers when John, their youngest, was only one year old. Ruth's brother's family was in a car accident that took the life of her sister-in-law. Because Ruth's brother and two of his three children were also injured, Don and Ruth took the children into their home and raised them for a year until her brother remarried. Ruth said, "I went into that situation with great fear and trepidation, seven kids, four under the age of 5. But God had plans, and He guided us through that year and gave us lasting memories of a houseful of kids and lots of love. Little did we know that God did indeed have plans because from that point on we found ourselves caregiving (in one way or another) for seventeen others, family, friends, and whomever God put in our path."

Another plan of God's was to bring them to First Lutheran. When they moved to Corona after their retirement, a pastor from Immanuel Lutheran Church in Orange told Ruth to attend First Lutheran. There, he said, you will receive the true Word from a true man of God, Pastor Kolander, and the joy of true Christian fellowship. He was right, God has led and blessed us with this beautiful church and pastor!!

Both Don and Ruth have made a beautiful and loving impact here at First Lutheran! They have served as editors of our newsletter for many years. This is a time, consuming process that all must be done in a short time. All this industrious labor, just so that we can all share in the news of our Church family. Their loving service has been so appreciated over the years! Don and Ruth are embarking on a new journey!
